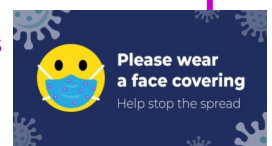
These need to be brought into school before the Camp Out event.

Walk to School Week (October 5-9, 2020)

I am writing to encourage you to support Living Streets' annual Walk to School Week with the aim of getting more primary school children walking to school.

It is a fun, week long activity which raises awareness of and celebrates the benefits of walking.

Walking to school is healthy, sociable, good for the environment and good for learning.

Research shows that children who do some form of exercise before school feel fit, refreshed and ready to learn.

Walking to school also reduces congestion, lowers carbon emissions and improves air quality.

It's vitally important to encourage parents and children to walk more. A generation ago, 70% of children walked to school – now it's less than half.

The Government has set a target of getting 55% of primary aged pupils to walk to school by 2025 in its new Cycling and Walking Investment Strategy.

I hope you will encourage your pupils to join in with Walk to School Week this year. Please send me pictures of the children on their walks – I would love to see them enjoying their surroundings and being kinder to the environment.
